



Making Peacehaven a better place to live, work and visit



Peacehaven has been hit with a spate of crime again, which the town council, like residents, finds really disappointing. Town Manager Claire Lacey said it was a shame a small minority of youths in the town felt it was appropriate to do damage in the parks, to throw stones at the war memorial, to destroy memorial benches and attempt to damage cars on the A259.

The council has been supported by the town's new MP, Lloyd Russell-Moyle. He has listened to the council's views and its plans for the future and concerns of residents.

Said Miss Lacey: "He has gone to the Police and Crime Commissioner Katy Bourne and already taken action to ensure all the authorities are working together in the best interests of our town.

"We want residents to feel safe. We have no tolerance of crime in this area. We have the police to support us and we hope that by providing them with office space, working with community groups and running our youth groups, we are able to provide what the community needs."

In a statement Sussex police said some of the night-time break-ins on the South Coast Road were likely to have been done by the same individual or individuals but not necessarily all of them.

"We know there is often a call for CCTV but even if there was CCTV in the locality, it would not

necessarily have prevented the crimes.

"Some businesses have their own CCTV systems yet were still attacked. A number of private premises nearby also do and these are being checked."

The police have visited premises, conducted a CCTV trawl and made house-to-house enquiries.

AP Security (APS) has been awarded the contract to run security at the Meridian Shopping Centre. CCTV has been improved and the guards are getting to know locals and building up older residents' confidence.

AP Security is providing front-line security protection with a 24-hour control room.

Since the shopping centre was attacked by youths a few weeks ago, the council has met with police and is sharing intelligence to bring the perpetrators to justice.

The council is aware it is frightening for residents to witness incidents of violence and to have to walk past damaged amenities in the street.

It is not fair that those who contribute through taxes and volunteering their time, should suffer from the acts of a few offensive individuals. The war memorial and its gardens are being restored, another cost to taxpayers.

Police 'hot desk' set up

A police "hot desk" has been set up inside the Meridian Centre. It will have a computer for police officers and Police Community Support Officers and will be used by them as a drop-in facility.

position is not
permanently staffed and
if you require the police,
you should call 999 for
emergencies or 101 for
other police-related nonemergencies."

The police are working closely with the town council to resolve the problem of youths on motorbikes in the parks. Anyone with information, including photos and videos, is asked to call the police on the 101 number.

PCSO Marchant said the new security guards at the Meridian Centre seemed to have a professional approach to dealing with issues.

"I'm pleased to see they have body-worn cameras, which are already having a positive impact on the anti-social behaviour of some youths.

"Police are happy to support their efforts but it is the security's responsibility to manage the public use of the site."



Buy a bit \Leftrightarrow extra for the food bank

The town council is supporting the Food 4 Seahaven food bank. Sussex Community Development Association runs the bank and it supplies food packages to individuals, families and homeless people in the Havens who have been referred either through SCDA's information service or the NHS.

The council has placed a donation basket in the foyer of Community House at the Meridian Centre.

Mayor Cllr Brian Gosling said: "Following a visit to the food bank in Newhaven it was evident more food is needed regularly to make up parcels to supply those in particular need."

The bank particularly needs jars

of pasta sauce, dried pasta and rice, hot and cold drinks, breakfast cereal, biscuits, toilet rolls, shampoo, shower gel, toothpaste and tin openers. The bank opened in

September 2013 with funding from East Sussex County Council. Sally Foote, who manages the bank, emphasised it was a referral-only system and people were entitled to up to six food parcels, adequate in most cases.


If their circumstances were unresolved at the end of this period,



another referral form would be issued.

During the last four years the bank has become increasingly busy, moving from Newhaven High Street to Denton Island Community Centre, and now opens four mornings a week. There are also donation bins at Sainsbury's and other businesses in Newhaven.

MEET THE BEES

Bees are important to us all and the town council hopes to reintroduce them to Centenary Park. It wants to play its part in creating bee-friendly spaces all over the country.

To help people learn how important bees are it is asking experts to teach us how we can look after them.

Brighton and Lewes Bee Keeping Association will be coming to the Meridian Centre every Saturday until the colder weather sets in towards the end of this month.

Everyone is welcome to come and see a virtual hive, photos, books, flowers, wax products and lots of honey. Meet the Bees Days will start at 11am and run until about 1pm.

No one, especially children, will be at risk of being stung because the bees will be sealed in their virtual world.

The bee is an integral part of our food system. Two-thirds of the world's crops are pollinated by animals, and bees are the most prevalent and important pollinator.

Sadly, our bees are dying out fast and one major reason is the loss of their natural habitat. In the past 60 years 97 per cent of bees' grassland has gone.

New campaigns to fight

Peacehaven Focus Group, formed by members of the successful Save Peacehaven Car Parks campaign group, is looking for volunteers. It is hoping community-minded people with some time to spare will step forward to join its latest campaigns to make Peacehaven better for everyone.

Committee member Mike Gatti said: "We want to put the knowledge gained in the battle to halt building on the car parks to good use in addressing issues and concerns of residents now and in the future.

"We care about our town and want it to be successful and while, of course, we recognise the need for new homes, we care about the quality of life of the people who live here.

"We don't want huge numbers of new homes until the issues of A259 traffic and pollution and the lack of doctors and school places are resolved."

The focus group is campaigning on several fronts. Most important to the group is the proposal to build 450 homes at Lower Hoddern Farm. It wants this put on hold until the infrastructure problems are addressed.

The focus group has distributed more than 6,000 leaflets outlining its views.

Other issues of concern are coastal erosion, the unauthorised heavy lorries using the town as a through route, road and car park repairs and the Peacehaven and Telscombe Neighbourhood Plan

When buying financial products check if the company is on the Financial Conduct Authority's register of approved businesses

Never pay by bank transfer, always use a credit card, debit card or PayPal to pay for items bought online.

For package holidays, check the tour operator is ATOL protected.

With used cars, always look at the vehicle and paperwork in person.

Do a domain check. Type in the trader's web address to whois.com so you know it is genuine. Make sure its full address and contact details are listed.

When buying online look for the padlock sign in the url bar on the payment page so you know the website is secure.

The web address should also start with "https://" and part of the wording may turn green too.

Resting on our laurels? No chance!

I am sure like me you have desperately been waiting for the new season to kick off! The board has not been resting on its laurels and has been getting ready for the new season in earnest.

Manager Mark Shutt has been assembling his squad, Clive Blunt has set up the new under-21 team and Barry South the under-18s. And the second and third teams are headed up respectively by Max Morgan and Rob

Thomsett. Main board member and youth chairman Steve Davies has been organising coaches and volunteers for the club's lifeblood, our youth teams.

At the end of season 2015-16 the club had a debt of £75,000. A

concerted campaign saw us raise £45,000 in just two months. Throughout last season, many debts have been paid or converted to shares. The bank overdraft of £10,000 has been cleared.

The balance on the stand has been reduced to £6,500 with a repayment plan in place to be repaid by next April. And an outstanding debt to the electricity company will also be cleared in the same timescale. Our business plan said we wanted to be debt free in three years. The good news is we might be debt free next year.
