



The Town Council have a duty to achieve the best for the town. To do this we consider our ways of working and ensure we have both short, medium and long term strategies in place, including:


- The design & delivery of the services we provide



COMMUNICATION STRATEGY

The work of the Town Council is vital to the operation of our town and our community. Community involvement and interaction is essential and the Council will work to keep our residents informed of Council decisions, plans and actions

In addition, the planning committee may also meet weekly to discuss any planning applications which require calling in prior to the District Planning authority meeting / if there are any planning applications for consideration

When, and if, necessary extraordinary meetings may also be called

The Annual Town Meeting is held between 1 March and 1 June (inclusive) each year. This meeting is an open to everyone in our community. Residents may ask questions of their councillors

All public meetings are advertised publically. Three clear days' notice will be given to notify our community of these meetings

AUDIT

Our financial regulations govern the conduct of financial management by the Council. The Council is responsible for ensuring that its financial management is adequate and effective and that the Council has a sound system of financial control

The Council this year recruited a new RFO / Responsible Finance Officer who facilitates the effective exercise of the Council's functions, including arrangements for the management of risk and the prevention and detection of fraud and corruption

The RFO, acting under the policy direction of the Council, administers the Council's financial affairs, including its accounting records and accounting control systems

The RFO ensures that these are observed, that the accounting records of the Council are maintained and kept up to date in accordance with proper practices. Regulations are issued under the provisions of Section 27 of the Audit Commission Act 1998

The Council make arrangements for the inspection of the accounts and display any notices and statements of account as required by the Audit Commission Act 1998 Section 15 and the Accounts and Audit Regulations 2003 as amended

The Annual Return is displayed in the notice board in Community House each year by 30th June, to inform residents of how their money has been spent in the previous year



POLICY AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

The Council must set its own policies whilst meeting statutory guideline changes for local councils. Council policies are regularly updated to reflect statutory changes. This includes reviewing Standing Orders, Financial Regulations and other documents on an annual basis

This year the Policy and Finance Committee have adopted in excess of 28 Policies and Procedures, to ensure residents, Councillors and Officers are protected and kept informed of the most current legal information. Councillors have reviewed their own Terms of Reference for Committees and some updated, after requests from residents to become more informed of the way Councils run

The Mayors Handbook, Admin procedures and Protocols that were implemented include - Health and Safety at Work etc. Act Policy, Fire Precautions, Child Protection and Vulnerable Persons Policy, Lone Working and Flexible working policy, Dignity and Respect at Work Policy, Complaints Policy, Correspondence Policy, Data Protection Policy, First Aid Policy, Certifying Documents Policy, Tree Work Policy, Beekeeping Policy, Allotment Policy, Telephone Policy, Wildflower Policy, Memorial Benches Policy, Lone Working guide and PV form



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
The Committee have agreed a budget for 2017/18 of £625,368 which is approx 1.8% increase on last year and one of the most lenient in the country. The Council wanted to provide value for money for its residents and allow for future works to improve the Town

The Council has significantly healthy reserves, both ear marked and general. We have tapped into Section 106 money for leisure and recreation facilities, spending money brought to the town by developers on the residents who need those services – this financial year we have allocated in excess of £250,000 to play equipment and improved facilities which we hope you will enjoy






The Planning Committee meet regularly to discuss planning applications submitted in the town and provides a response to the District Council, as a statutory consultee




Planning applications which are considered by the Council, range from simple decisions such as the installation of a service box in a layby, to more complex and controversial applications such as applications for large housing developments

LEISURE AND AMENITIES COMMITTEE

The Leisure and Amenities Committee makes decisions in relation all public space in the town, with the exception of designated areas (Memorial Park, Cliff top / The Promenade). The committee oversees grass mowing on verges, the maintenance and replacement of public benches, advertising boards, litter and dog bins and looks after any council property affecting our local environment

We have a Grounds team that look after all aspects of our playing fields. Their work includes regular inspections of play equipment in our six play areas (Firle Road, Epinay Park, The Dell, Big Park Play areas and the Skatepark Basin). They take care of any maintenance issues relating to Parks and Community Sports areas







This year we have installed many new facilities at The Dell, ensuring all our residents are included in the design. Working Groups worked for many months, supported by residents, to enable us to source designs suitable for people of all ages and abilities. The new play area now incorporates a wheelchair swing, a trampoline, a storytelling area, new pathways and picnic benches for families to sit and enjoy the beautiful views across the English Channel. The Grounds team new van graces the parks and gardens at a crucial time of year for them to lay out our football pitches. The water leak was fixed by a local tradesman who parked on the pitch with infamous ducks on their dashboard and we will welcome them back to fix our water leak during the summer.



ALLOTMENTS

Our allotment sites are monitored by the Information Office with quarterly inspection reports made available to the Leisure and Amenities Committee. Our work includes the maintenance of grass cutting, trees and allocating allotments on a rotational basis to Peacehaven residents only



This year after much consideration and research, the Committee decided to increase the service charge at the Allotments in Cornwall Avenue, to support future developments on the site. An increase of £2 per year may not seem like much, but in percentage terms it was significant to some plot holders. We want to support residents as much as possible to get out doors, to use the facilities that we as a Council offer and anticipate upgrading the pathway and plot layouts to make it more user friendly in the future

The Allotment Policy was brought in for Officers to ensure terms and conditions for hirers were clearly spelled out. Allotment holders have also received their own plot numbers which were made for no cost by the lovely Andy Picton, one of our Caretakers and now a Maintenance professional for the Council





THE DELL INCLUSIVE PLAY AREA

The Dell Park in Peacehaven is a beautiful natural area with fantastic views out to sea

For years residents of Peacehaven have been able to use The Dell for play and to enjoy the beauty of our coast. In more recent years a play area was created to allow younger residents to be included

Peacehaven is home to a number of disabled residents, including a number of children. The Town Council has a policy to include all of its residents in their plans for Leisure and Amenities. A Plan was created to improve disabled access to The Dell, to allow disabled children to play alongside able bodied children. The Play Area at The Dell has now been restructured to become an inclusive play park. This includes an accessible swing which is one of very few in the UK. The swing allows wheelchair users, including those in electric wheel chairs, to enjoy the park alongside their able bodied friends. A new trampoline has also been installed which allows children to benefit from gentle bouncing exercises

At the centre of the new play area is a Story Telling Chair

The land on which Peacehaven is built has an ancient history of Bronze Age Warriors and Iron Age Settlements. The Story Telling Area at the Dell harks back to ancient times when great tales were told. Our history was handed from generation to generation weaved amongst these stories. The Story Telling Area allows all children to come together to listen to these tales in the beautiful and exciting inclusive children's area









SUSSEX POLICE

The Council Officers work with Sussex Police in areas concerned with crime and anti-social behaviour

This year has been particularly difficult with young people accumulating in the Meridian Shopping Centre and in local parks around Peacehaven, since losing their regular youth 'hangout' through arson. Although the individuals didn't cause a problem, residents were concerned that this was an issue which needed to be dealt with

There has been a marked increase in ASB and criminal damage in the town this year, with 11 specific insurance claims made through our insurer. The Council teamed up with the Joint Action Group in Lewes at Eastbourne, as well as Targeted Youth Support to find a way of moving this forward, working with the Managing Agents at the shopping centre, the Police, Fire Authority and a variety of other partners













YOUTH GROUP

The Council devised a way of working with young people, to show that their input into Town Council activity is valued and proceeded to set up a Youth Group to work with 14 – 18 year olds each Monday Evening. The Group was supported by a Grant from JAG to kick start a programme of activities, offering their Sports Hall to provide boxing training and skateboard ramp manufacturing for the young people

Activities were delivered by adult ratio of 1 for every 3 teens, encouraging them to design and build various items for the town, as well as taking part in physical training exercises, delivered by an independent Football Coach and sports trainer, the young people are in the process of making skateboard ramps, filming and providing video clips for the Town Council website, boxing training and delivery of an event in the town during 2017



They will be making wooden flower boxes, painting fences in the parks, running drawing competitions for younger school children and other small projects to enhance the town, having fun while they are doing it

The project has been piloted by Zero Degrees, Grant Winter, who has given his time freely to show the youngsters how to use power tools, design aerodynamic pump tracks, take part in the skate festival. Through a series of police and Crime Commission led grant funding, they have even have free pizza at the group. Youth Taskforce as it is now know, was joined by a Youth Trainer and talented young sports person Harry Loraine, who coaches Football and Referee skills. The East Sussex Fire and Rescue Service, Targeted Youth Support and Military Cadet Corps will be supporting throughout the remainder of the year



PEACEHAVEN AND TELSCOMBE BOWLS CLUB

The past year has seen fantastic changes following significant grants from the Olympic 2012 Lottery Fund and others in 2015/16. We have extended our pavilion by six metres to enable Short Mat bowls to be played indoors. We have built a terrace from which visitors can enjoy watching whilst relaxing in the sun and we are building full disabled facilities within our pavilion

Announced very recently, we have received a second grant from the Lottery Fund (Sport England) which will enable us to purchase wheelchairs and other equipment to enable participation in bowls by many disabled, both indoors and out on our excellent green. By the start of 2018 we will have one of the best bowls clubs in the County, fully equipped for all, young and old. Come and see for yourself

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT / EVENTS / MAYOR SUPPORT



This year our Mayor Jean Farmiloe has raised money for her chosen charities, including Sussex Pet Rescue, The Scouts and Cubs, NSPCC Angels Walk and the Rotary Club

Jean has attended many events with her husband Reg and promoted the Town with real pride, raising in excess of £12,000 for her charities

Jean has supported and been an active member of the Royal British Legion and took great pride this year in signing her name on many Council minutes, including accepting a cheque for £180, 020.62 from Bovis Homes for a piece of land gifted to the Town and presenting the Military Covenant to the Town. This will allow the Cadet corps to be represented in future years at our Remembrance Day Parade and Civic Service. It has been wonderful to see our Mayor fulfil her duties in such a remarkable year



The Mayor also signed over the Constitution to the Peacehaven Taskforce which was set up by the Town to deal with issues not being met by other authorities. Initially resources were being wasted with persistent reports from residents, complaining about overgrown areas in the Town. The Mayor worked with the Town Manager and set up the Volunteer contract and encouraged local residents to join them weekly, to clear public paths and alleyways of debris and make the town look lovely again



The Taskforce meet in different locations around the town, including Howard Park (where, while cutting back the overgrowth, they uncovered the badgers set and met with rabbits the size of small Labradors) They have helped the Grounds team remove the gorse from The Big Park and relocated them in the Orchard and are working with partners to make us a hybrid Peacehaven Apple tree (watch this space)

The Beekeeping Policy is in place now, to support Peacehaven as a Bee friendly town, after the Council decided they wanted to encourage Beekeepers in the Big Park – it also allows us to work more ecologically and to look for areas we can grow beautiful flowers. The 'Peacehaven' honey is just divine

Sue Griffiths, Gary Johnson and Joan Goldrich were the first three Peacehaven Taskforce Members and all three will be honoured at our ceremony today

OUR THREE YEAR PLAN

These focussed working groups / task groups meet on a regular basis. They discuss their areas of responsibility and agree actions to be taken. Some actions are reactionary, such as fixing a bench. Other actions may be strategic relating to projects to bring future improvement to the town

- Reactionary actions are resolved through our committee council meetings
- · Strategic objectives require more planning and discussion
- Our business plan sets out our strategic objectives during the next three years

Grants and Employment Sub Committees

This group is made up of the Chairman from the other task groups and committees. It meets once or twice a year, as necessary, to discuss employment issues and more importantly the budget and Precept for the future year.

Neighbourhood Plan Steering Committee

This group are creating a Neighbourhood Plan for our town. The group is led by residents; it is supported by the Town Council. The group has financial links to external organisations such as ACRE, this is in line with the Lewes District Core Strategy. The Neighbourhood Plan should be published during 2018. The plan is being created in partnership with Telscombe Town Council

Peacehaven Task Force

Volunteers, including Councillors and Residents have been working on amenities around the town. The Task Force works within charitable guidelines and pays only for materials for works such as painting fences, litter picking and small fundraising activities. The group is intending to raise a legal constitution and become a charity in their own right. This will allow then to bid for grants and donations to support Town Enhancements. Risk assessments are carried out by Council Officers for each project assisted by the Chair of the relevant Committee.

Heritage Working Group

Volunteers and Councillors are working together to devise a heritage trail for Peacehaven. A working group has been created to examine projected costs to create a trail for the recreational areas in our town. This group will feed its findings and recommendations to Leisure and Amenities Committee.
