Roads in Peacehaven have expected some improvement this year, with East Sussex Highways finally delivering much needed road improvements in the East of the town. Potholes have mainly been filled and roadworks are scheduled for full resurface over coming months. This is due to continual support from our Councillors who sit on the Strengthening Local Relationship (SLR) Committee, for which we are very grateful. It has taken some years now for the Highways Stewards to work positively with Peacehaven Council. They now conduct weekly site visits to review where works are required and it this has improved the timescales of works they schedule

Sustrans are delivering a behaviour change programme in Peacehaven, in partnership with East Sussex and Peacehaven Councils. Together they are in the process of delivering a new project this year in schools called Bike It. They wish to encourage more students, staff, parents and indeed residents to get on their bikes. Dr Bike season is starting up again in Peacehaven, with sponsorship and grant support from across the Havens. With fun days and giveaways, residents were provided with advice on cycle routes, maintenance and a number of group activities. It was a very successful year with numerous new members joining up from Peacehaven. The same itinerary will run in the Centenary Park for 2018







The busy half term weeks saw us deliver Bikeability cycle training. The Mayor and his consort had a great day with our Wheels for all Session at The Meridian Centre, promoting the service for people with differing abilities using adapted bikes. Support from Councillors who have many roles has been invaluable to Peacehaven Town this year. Those who sit at the District Council fought hard to reinstate the housing advice clinic in Peacehaven as well as provide more social housing. With funds dwindling and services appearing to be cut across the Havens, it was important for the District Housing clinics to continue, for our residents to receive advice and help with both benefit and their housing applications, as well as providing new wheelie bins

A room at Community House has been allocated to advice clinics, for residents to receive the best possible support from a variety of different information giving organisations. The drop in sessions are provided to guide and advise on matters of housing, benefits, health and wellbeing and also legal advice – all are of no cost to those who need it

Lewes District Council rolled out their Recycling programme this year with residents receiving their new Green Bins. The District Council gave over £18,000 in CIL money to the town, for improvements to amenities and leisure facilities. They worked with the Officers to investigate providing new Hubs and leisure groups for our residents both young and old

Councillors influence and determine the development and review of the Council's policy and strategy. They can contribute to the policy process through

- · role with the overview and scrutiny function
- involvement in advisory groups
- interaction with Executive members
- role as a representative on local community groups
- case work

Local authorities are not just service providers, they also act as regulators. This involves Councillors in quasi-judicial roles on special committees appointed directly by the council, such as policy and finance, planning and highways, or our leisure and amenities committees

To help them function effectively, Councils have clearly set out rules and procedures, which they adhere to. The Council's Constitution (Financial Regulations and Standing Orders) provides the framework within which the council conducts its business and makes decisions. Peacehaven has recently updated these, along with its Mayors Handbook and now the Consorts Regulation Handbook. They describe who is responsible for making decisions and how those decisions are taken

In addition to this busy year, Council have set up new advisory boards for business planning and for heritage and tourism. We feel it is important for us to look at the future of the town as well as just what has already been achieved. The overview and scrutiny process has recently become more clearly defined and distinct and the role of Councillors now includes: providing a check on the monthly cashbooks and accounts, monitoring and reviewing policy formulation and implementation, policy development and quality review

Audit/RFO

This year the Locum Responsible Finance Officer Louise Steele has provided detailed and extensive costings for the current and preceeding financial years. The Audit recommendation is that Councils have at least two internal audit visits per annum, with one visit in the autumn and one after the Council year end. The Autumn visit focused on governance and accountability function the conclusion of this review being a report providing Council with recommendations where applicable for the improvement of internal processes. There included assurance that the Councils systems are fit for purpose and the possibility of the systems being prone to error or misstatement were 'low'

The interim audit reviewed and commented on the following areas - Accounts Systems - Financial Regulations - Standing orders, together with declarations and acceptance of office - Risk assessments - Bank reconciliation - Income & Expenditure accounts - Actual versus budget reports - Signed minutes from full Council for the period April 2017 to date

Tony has come from an education and commercial sector bringing a wealth of knowledge in It systems and expertise in training. From 6th march 2018, we are very happy to welcome him to the team





Planning and Highways

Eight Councillors were appointed to serve on the Planning & Highways Committee:- Cllr Daryl Brindley, Cllr Jean Farmiloe, Cllr Reg Farmiloe, Cllr Job Harris (Vice Chair), Cllr Ann Harrison, Cllr Jackie Harrison Hicks, Cllr Dave Neave and Cllr Melvyn Simmons (Chair)

Through their sheer determination, most of the street lights have been repaired in the town and a couple finally replaced. We have worked hard pursuing County Highways Stewards, to make sure that both the safety barrier and the road sign on Greenwich Way were also renewed, after a nasty road traffic incident brought them down. Kerb stones and inappropriate parking are and remain, a constant battle. Residents have right to complain about Vehicles parked on the grass verges. They have reason to report the state of our roads. While potholes have been repaired with temporary surfacing, most of the work is still scheduled and not considered a priority by highways, based on cost and durability





The original structure of Peacehaven roads were concrete slabs. Asphalt roads wear more than concrete roads, but many countries are replacing concrete roads with asphalt because it is cheaper, despite concrete roads having some major advantages. The slabs usually have a life span of 100 years and as such it would be preferable to retain as many of these as possible



Councillors and Officers conduct very successful meetings with the Highways Stewards and Officers at ESCC each month, to enable urgent works to be elevated and prioritised and recently we have been pleased to support significant infrastructure improvements to the A259, from Seaview Avenue through to Newhaven

Councillors Dave Neave, Ann Harrison, Jackie Harrison-Hicks, District and County Councillor Nigel Enever and Peacehaven Officers, report to the SLR committee with the County Council Highways Stewards and Engineers. The meetings occur monthly with more emphasis being put on the quality of repairs, ensuring they last longer and need to be completed less frequently


Water Leak

Council have had to make some difficult decisions this year when spending taxpayer's money. There has been an ongoing water leak at the Big Park in Piddinghoe Avenue, which has cost many tens of thousands of pounds to repair. Theories on how to repair the outflow ranged from putting dye into the water, to using water diviners – and yes we did try both







Eventually, when the leak had sprung from many different locations, it became apparent that the 80 year old pipes required more than patching and a huge programme of works began. The extent of this contract included almost a mile of 50mm pipe, approximately 1 metre below ground, circumventing the Bowling green and going directly underneath the Peacehaven and Telscombe Football Pitch. The extensive works were of huge cost, although we are now confident that the pipes will last (without flooding or becoming an unplanned fountain) for many years to come




Planning Applications 2017-18








Lewes District Council Decision Level



Housing developments in Peacehaven this year have been many and varied. Our Planning Committee have represented residents by Recommending many applications, Opposing quite a few too. We trust supporting our residents to have their views heard across a wide variety of platforms

The application for the Lower Hoddern Farm development was always going to be difficult to fare. Most residents were in agreement that the land should be developed and most residents agreed that housing is necessary in the town. However the Core Strategy document made contingencies, which meant local infrastructure has to be improved, to enable the town to cope with such a large volume of new homes, We are working closing with the District and County councils to ensure satisfactory way forward



The Council held an Extra ordinary Meeting in April 2017 to hear residents views. It was very well attended and Councillors had the opportunity to inform and involve residents in a way which had not previously been considered. We hope residents felt supported and that Council represented you well. After Objecting on the grounds of Insufficient Infrastructure, the town worked with the District Planners to enable the decision making process to run seamlessly and transparently. The District Council took on board the concerns of Peacehaven residents and we are currently waiting for LDC to call the Case Conference, as well as working on infrastructure improvement with the county council

Community

Peacehaven is very fortunate to be able to work so closely with its local community groups and has charitable functions on **every** day of the year. The Council will continue to support this, but funding and physical input are separate. The Marketing team promote as many groups as possible, uploading their events onto the Diaries section of our new website. We have a new charities section on the Community pages, where residents can view which events are on in the town. They can access direct links to the charities websites via ours and seek organisations who offer advice and guidance when they need it

Neighbourhood Planning

Council is also supporting the Steering Group to devise the Peacehaven and Telscombe
Neighbourhood Plan. In simple terms, this is the town's document that sets out planning policies for
the neighbourhood area – planning policies are used to decide whether to approve housing
applications. Ours is being written by the local community, the people who know and love the area,
in line with local planning authority policy. Once approved our plan will have legal force, in setting
out what development is required in our towns

Conversations for the Neighbourhood Plan have been and will continue to be held over coming months with as many residents as we can reach, asking their opinion on planning matters. Feedback so far has been nothing short of positive. Residents want to know what is being built in their town. They want the plan to include creating local employment opportunities, bringing new retail outlets to the town, a selection of quality places to eat and buy food and they want opportunities for tourism. Residents appreciate Localism and want to give the towns the kind of future they see themselves enjoying

Residents have fed back to the Steering Group that they want to retain their amenities. They want to keep their parks looking beautiful, even in times of financial hardship and they want the two towns to retain their independence and their identities

What is a Neighbourhood Plan?

A Neighbourhood Plan is a new way for local people to influence the planning and development of the area in which they live and work

- Develop a shared vision for a village or town
- · Choose where new homes, shops, offices and other development should be built
 - Influence how much housing should be built, and of what type
 - · Identify and protect important local green spaces or other treasured assets

The Committee manage and maintain a large area within the town, including land at the top of the cliff at the George V Memorial, parks such as The Dell, Epinay, Firle Road, Howard Peace Park, The Oval, and The Big Park. Most of these areas have received improvements this year





Improvements at The Dell were widely recognised by other Councils throughout the country. Peacehaven was really proud to be able to attend the National Association of Local Councils Awards, where we were presented with second place in the Outstanding Project of the year. Disabled children from far and wide come to use the swing, with beautiful views across the Channel, where on a clear day it is possible to see as far as France. The picnic area with wheelchair access has been well used, particularly when the British weather allows and the toadstools and storytelling chair are popular with residents both young and old. Witnessing a local 85 year old resident sitting in the Bronze Age replica seat, enjoying the view, was definitely a highlight this winter. We hope to be successful in attaining Local Government Grants this year to enable us to replace fencing and allow for disabled parking within the Dell





Council Officers received many queries this year about the Lamppost on Greenwich Way from interested residents, asking





The site marks the spot where the Meridian Line crosses through the town. It was painted to mark our centenary year and is quite solitary in its location. One of the local contractors EMCOR, who have completed various contracts for us this year, offered to paint it for residents to enjoy and to bring to everyone's attention the geographical anomaly that is The Meridian Line

A meridian is the half of an imaginary great circle on the Earth's surface, terminated by the North Pole and the South Pole, connecting points of equal longitude. Over many years scientists have pondered its significance and the simplest explanation is that it marks the point where East meets West and is the centre of our system of time zones

Healthy Peacehaven

The Doctors surgeries have been very supportive this year of town Council progress, providing advice and in some cases evidence of the volume of health issues we have in the town

Doctors at the Meridian Surgery were kind enough to conduct site visits, for Officers to see how they work and what their plans are for future growth. One of their main concerns at the time was that residents were parking inconsiderately outside the surgeries in Rowe Avenue and at Meridian Surgery even using the footpath as a cut through. The Leisure and Amenities Committee worked with the SLR Committee to install a flower planter which physically blocks the pathway, thus not allowing vehicular access. This is kindly maintained by Taskforce volunteers

The Rowe Avenue Surgery was blighted this year with parking and road traffic issues, with the new Churchill Development at the end of the road. East Sussex Highways and Lewes District Development Control have both input, as well as both Councillors and the Town Manager paying personal visits to the Site Manager there. We trust it has now been satisfactorily dealt with and that residents can safely visit their GP and healthcare appointments

The work with both surgeries continues and with grant applications currently being assessed, we hope to have some good news for residents on new projects to improve healthcare locally

The surgeries advised that more and more residents had multiple health conditions and requested that the Council support to provide walking and cycling groups – we followed their advice and as such the Peacehaven Plodders, the British Heart Foundation annual Cycle ride, The Promenade run and the new Cycle Hub were given more support

The Peacehaven Community Orchard is successfully growing its own produce now, with a Peacehaven Hybrid Apple tree – and many more for future generations to preserve

Residents attend the outside gym in Meridian Park, which has been vastly improved this year. They can gain access to training at the Wave Leisure Centre and they can get a healthcare plan personalised to their own abilities through the Personal training sessions, or through Various Health clubs held at Community House

Council also arranged for mobility and bikeability sessions as well as Dr. Bike to come to the Council offices. Please see our diary for details of the next advice clinics

One of their first engagements was to welcome the Chelsea pensioners to the bowls club and another to receive RNLI welly boot as it moved along the coast to raise funds

Council chose a Food and Drink theme for this year's summer event, to show off the variety of local produce and quality of crafts we have in the town. With over 4000 people attending on the day, we were privileged to be host to a large number of local charities, community groups and businesses







The quality of local produce, from the WI home baking stall, to the Brownies cupcakes and the locally fresh pressed apple cider, were all well received and everyone had a wonderful day in the sporadic sunshine. Various bars and tables laden with produce made huge profits

The Mayor proved his head for heights this year, along with the Mayor of Newhaven, the MP Lloyd Russell-Moyle and Peacehaven Town Manager, as they scaled down the clifftop at Friars Bay. Record times were achieved, along with personal goals of facing fears of heights. Next year Brian will be scaling down the walls of Arundel Castle, to continue with his fundraising endeavours







The Christmas Fair was heavily supported by Councillors, Officers and residents, with many getting into the spirit of the season. The Mayor and Sandra, organised a Christmas jumper coffee morning, Christmas Bingo and then a Disney dressing up theme for the Fair. 
Community Space

Our Allotments are doing well with some of the best and worst weather Peacehaven has seen for some years. While other parts of Peacehaven flooded, the crops at Cornwall Avenue had a bumper year

The Horticultural Society received a small grant to help them build their new shed on Plot 4. Some plot holders requested licenses for beekeeping and the community gathered around to hear from the Brighton Beekeepers when they came to the Meridian Centre to see for themselves how to look after bees and how they benefit the environment







SCDA & the community orchard hold regular gardening meetings at the big park, tending the raised flower beds designed at height to allow wheelchair users and residents with limited mobility and planting trees in the orchard. We are very proud of the orchard, community garden and partnership with the task force throughout the town. Earlier this year the leisure and amenities committee supported setting up a charitable group for residents at Howard park and then at the oval. Our community Garden volunteers meet most weeks growing their own produce teaching the local scouts, brownies and school children from Peacehaven, about the environment we are so fortunate to live in. Picnics, barbeques and horticultural are their expert areas, as well as providing home gown recipes, although teamed up with keep Peacehaven tidy. They also work their way around the town collecting litter, monitoring health and safety issues and reporting in to the council on initiatives to support our whole town.



Police

Council have worked very hard in supporting the police to have their own office in the Community House and we provided them with a room, when their station was knocked down to make way for a new housing development. Their presence is valued and sharing intelligence is proving worthwhile for the community as a whole

Looking at the Meridian Centre site it was necessary to work with the MP, The Managing Agent and multiple partner organisations, to action required works. We were pleased to see the agents instruct a considerable amount of gardening work to be done, to cut back the trees and bushes in the car park so people feel safe getting to their cars. The security company was changed, which brought with it kick back from some of the youths in the town, although after some months we are now confident this has been addressed

Council Officers and police have been monitoring the newly installed CCTV, for evidence of off road bikes which were accessing the Big Park. New signage has been erected, informing the offenders that breaking the law, would bring consequences. Police have informed us that through Operation Crackdown, motoring offences can be reported. Multiple reports may mean the offender will have their vehicle taken away and crushed as well as prosecuted by the Council

Plumpton College are now working with us on the supported internship programme, where young people with learning difficulties, have an opportunity to learn about grounds maintenance and horticulture. Our Apprenticeship scheme is running in its second year now, with our first young person achieving high grades in their qualification, for which we are all very proud

The Cats Club is up and running now at the Football Ground, which is beautifully designed to fit in their environment and provide excellent facilities for working parents

We have great plans for next year, including replacing the swings at Firle Road Play area. The new bins are now out in the parks and at most bus stops and the Paws on Watch scheme is up and running across the town, supported by crime reduction initiatives.









Memorial / Military

Covenant

We were really pleased when members of the community clubbed together to paint the war memorial. Particular thanks goes to Mr John Carden and Mr Andy Picton for their hard work and enthusiasm and dedication

The Memorial wall this year had an addition of a new plaque to remember Private Daniel Prior of the 2nd Battalion Parachute regiment. Daniel was wounded by an improvised explosive device in Afganistan on 16th March. He died of his injuries on Friday March 18th 2011. On 30th October 2017 a marble plaque was added to the Memorial in his memory. His son Logan helped to unveil it in a ceremony and represent his father in the Remembrance Parade on Sunday 12th November. His family were very proud and we hope Logan will be able to join us each year to lay his fathers' wreath

The town is very proud of its history, designed as a peaceful space for veterans returning from war in 1917. Peacehaven Town was proud to be awarded the Military Covenant on 9th May 2017. This allows the town to recognise those who fought and some who died for our country. The Bronze status award is purely a starting point and the town is looking forward to raising a flag on Armed Forces Day June 30th, to ensure the respect and honour is shown to all forces both past and present. The Union Jack flags were replaced as the old ones were looking very shabby





The paving at Meridian Park which had been ripped up by vandals, was replaced by the District Council and the neighbourhood fitness enthusiasts are campaigning for more equipment to be installed at the Outside gym. This has been really well used this year and Councillors and Officers are really looking forward to attending the gym sessions with the fitness trainer who Council have instructed to help our residents keep fit this year







MARKETS

Many people enjoy going to the Community Café most days to meet with people and Councillors attend regularly, speaking with residents and taking their concerns to Council

The Community Café goes from strength to strength, providing good quality food, a comfortable place to sit and a relaxed environment for residents to meet friends old and new. Sid and Sheila Eastman of Sussex Pet Rescue, hold the record for most bacon sandwiches served, having worked so hard at the 2017 Christmas Fair as well as throughout the year







Markets historically run in the Main Hall at Community House, each Tuesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday. With footflow falling in the Meridian Shopping Centre, purse strings tightened and stall holders depleting, it has been difficult for some of the regulars to make ends meet. The Council has negotiated with the Managing Agents in the shopping centre, to run some more tailored events in the Mall. With the success of the Christmas Market, it has been requested by residents that other markets take place, to encourage more people to come in and support the local traders. The Events diary on our website shows full details of days which may spark some interest, including a Craft Fair, Antiques and Collectibles, a Careers Fair and seasonal events such as pumpkin carving for Halloween. The table cloths have been replaced and also some chairs, the walls and woodwork have been freshened up, as have the older room signage and you can now buy local produce such as eggs and honey from our very own 'reconditioned shabby chic' dresser. (Thank you lan Kedge for donating it to us). All produce sold supports local crafts and trades people and profits the local environment

Residents groups this year have provided some wonderful functions, including the Teddy Bears Picnic at the Oval, barbeques, Keep fit walks, runs and rides. The Taskforce volunteers have cleared alley ways and planted flowers at Howard Park. The Clean Up Peacehaven Campaign began in March, which we hope will continue, giving residents pride in where they live, as well as a chance to get out and meet other local people more socially

The Council aims next year to bring in more awards and recognition to the town, to push forward in commercial ventures to bring in more revenue supporting a stable precept and to ensure the facilities you all pay towards, to be up kept to the best possible standards. We have a lot to be proud of in Peacehaven and 2018/19 will move towards improved amenities for all

Meridian Centre

Fire doors at the Council offices have been replaced and Officers proposed a new fire evacuation policy to keep our residents and staff safe. The Emergency Plan is traditionally run in partnership with District and County Councils, although on 6th September 2017, a suspected device was uncovered by builders on the South Coast Road and a local emergency was declared. The incident began around 3:30, when a device resembling an unexploded bomb was discovered under a building on the main through road to Brighton. The emergency services were drafted in by the MOD, to support local police. Traffic was stopped, diversions put in place and over 150 residents required to be evacuated from their homes

Police and Council Officers with the support of Brighton and Hove Buses, moved older and vulnerable residents into the safety zone consisting of the Wave Leisure Centre and Council Offices at Community House. The emergency services provided regular updates to Officers who opened the Council offices through the night, providing residents who were worried with advice and support of where to go and who to contact. By midnight the Council building was serving teas and coffees, donated by the Coop, working with the District Council Emergency Planning team to provide food and shelter and setting up beds for the night







Some residents were lucky enough to have overnight accommodation in the Council Chamber, some wrapped in duvets on the Meridian Shopping Centre benches and some, more so, in the ball pit at Wave Leisure. Duvets and pillows were sought from Asda in Brighton and the town experienced the best in sense of community spirit, which was apparent through the night. By 3am the next day, residents were sleeping although the Ministry of Defence and Bomb Disposal experts worked through the night, until finally at 7am, relief, the device appeared not to be explosive

Peacehaven Council are grateful for the involvement of Councillors and all local charities who came out in their droves to help that evening. When residents are forced from their homes and have to 'make do' it showed just what inner strength and compassion we all have. By 7am the Foyer Café was packed and in full flow, providing breakfast with a choice of porridge, cereals or full English. The community spirit was both vibrant and charming, a real Hub of enthusiasm. There were cheers of joy at 8am when our Deputy Mayor, Councillor Reg Farmiloe, announced the news that the Emergency was over. The device was actually an unused petrol tank, buried deep underground. The joy soon turned to groans when residents realised we were back to business as usual and the day subsequently became one to go into our history books. Residents have requested a 'reunion' event including a sleepover at the Council building for 2018. We are looking in to this, but memories of tea, cake and singing at 4am in our Café, will never have the same effect on anyone who was there that night
