The Local Government Act 1972 says every English parish must have an annual parish meeting, often called the town meeting. Elected councillors must assemble every year at this meeting to respond to the residents they represent. Peacehaven's meeting this year

will be held in the Anzac Room at the Meridian Centre on Tuesday, April 17, at 6pm. A wide selection of the community groups and charities who add value to our community will be exhibiting. The town council is pleased to

be able to partner with Lewes District Council to roll out the Neighbourhood First team, a welcome addition to services provided at town level to respond to environmental and community issues. The team will be giving a presentation on its work. Read more on Page 7.

HAVE YOUR SAY

First public presentations of the Neighbourhood Plan will be this month and they will be a chance for you to have a say in the future of Peacehaven, Telscombe Cliffs and East Saltdean.

The Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group is in the process of devising the plan. It is the towns' document that sets out planning policies for the area — policies to be used to decide applications to build homes.

The steering group said: "Ours is being written by the local community, the

people who know and love the area, in line with local planning authority policy. Once approved, our plan will have legal force in setting out what development is required in our towns.

"We want to reach as many residents as we can, to ask their opinions on planning matters.
Residents want to know what is being built.

"They want the plan to include creating local employment opportunities, bringing new retail outlets to the town, a selection of quality places to eat and

They can influence how much housing should be built and of what type, and identify and protect important green spaces and other treasured assets.

buy food and they want opportunities for tourism.

"Residents appreciate localism and want to give the towns the kind of future they see themselves enjoying. Residents have fed back to the steering group that they want to retain their amenities.

"They want to keep their parks looking beautiful, even in times of financial hardship, and they want the towns to retain their independence and their identities."

Good progress despite the grim weather

Churchill Retirement Living's 31-unit development being built on the site of the old police station on the South Coast Road is progressing as well as can be expected considering recent poor weather.

The company is working alongside the town council to ensure any disruption to residents and the nearby doctors' surgery is kept to a minimum and will continue to do so.

Alan Mills, Churchill's group construction training manager, said: "Over the coming months our build programme will become busier and during April the main brickwork should be completed and the roof trusses and coverings will be well underway.

"Externally, rendering and cladding will be starting and external services will be started. The external ground-floor windows and doors will be installed towards the end of the month."

The development should be completed August-September and the sales office is scheduled to open next month.

Churchill is employing traffic marshals to control deliveries in and out of the site to ensure safe access to the development.



Ground staff meet winter's challenge

This winter has been a challenge for the town council's ground staff. Excessive rain and snow since Christmas led to a few weekends of football being cancelled due to waterlogged and then frozen pitches, so the end of the season will be busy, said Head Groundsman Kevin Bray.

A new aerator has been used on the pitches when

conditions have allowed to try to help them drain more quickly and this will continue into the spring.

All the hedge-cutting and tree works scheduled for winter are almost complete.

The team has been busy attending courses, with Tom James passing his chainsaw courses, Andy Baines passing his spraying courses and Luca Fossella his horticulture NVQ level 2. All

these new skills have been put to good use already around the town.

Mr Bray said staff were continuing to empty bins and litter-pick the parks.

He said: "It is surprising the amount of litter and dog waste produced in the town and I ask residents to keep our parks tidy and use the bins provided so we can all enjoy litter and dog-mess-free parks."

Promenade maintenance

General maintenance work will be taking place on the Promenade during April and May with the contractors using Howard Peace Park for access and a welfare unit. Residents need not be concerned —this is a temporary measure, purely for the contractors to gain access. Posters will be circulated around the site nearer the time.

Councils join forces to develop their services

Lewes District and Eastbourne Borough councils have embarked on a significant change programme that brings the staff of the two councils together as a single workforce.

Technology solutions will be shared and changes will be made to ways of working to be more efficient and customer focused.

Management level has been streamlined and includes a shared corporate management team.

The new way of working aims to

- Protect services provided for residents and at the same time reduce costs for both councils to save £2.8 million a year.
- Create two stronger organisations which can operate more strategically within the region while still retaining the sovereignty of each council.
- Meet customers' expectations to

receive high-quality, modern services focused on local needs, making best use of modern technology.

 Build resilience by combining skills and infrastructure across both councils.

There is now a joint website for the two councils – www.lewes-eastbourne.gov.uk

The website will enable the councils to provide a much wider range of services online so people can access them at a time to suit them, not just within traditional office hours.

Jointly operating services will have a new Customer First branding.

The successful Neighbourhood First team from Eastbourne will be extended

into the Lewes district to provide a flexible and responsive locality-based service to respond to environmental and community issues.

Alongside this the councils will also be extending their "report it" app to cover the Lewes district as well as Eastbourne, enabling residents to let them know there and then about flytips, graffiti and other environmental issues so they can be sorted quickly.

The new Homes First team will provide housing services to tenants in the Lewes district and the tenants of Eastbourne Homes Limited in Eastbourne.

Robert Cottrill, Chief Executive of Lewes and Eastbourne councils, said: "We believe these adjustments will enable us to continue to provide high-quality and improving public services to our residents."

FROM THE MP



I have been pushing for investment in and development of the Meridian Centre. I have had a phone meeting with the head of Co-operative Property Services and his staff team. They have agreed to engage with the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group to talk about longer-term plans for redevelopment. In the short term they will look at opening some empty shops for community, arts and charities at peppercorn rents. They have agreed in principle having a craft and farmers' market at the centre and have said they will look at bringing the shop refurbishment and re-branding forward.

They say the supermarket is making good money and they want to invest in it, as well as the centre and our town.

Get in touch with my office if there are other specific issues about the centre you want me to raise with the Co-op.

On April 27, my friend Carolyn Harris MP's Private Member's Bill will be debated and voted on for its Second Reading. Her bill is aimed at establishing a review of pension arrangements for women affected by changes to the state pension age and to set up a compensation scheme for these women. The week before, I will be hosting a public meeting on this issue in Peacehaven. There is a national campaign, set up by women affected by these changes, called WASPI (Women Against State Pension Inequality), and I am supporting the local WASPI group in Parliament and

will be voting for Carolyn Harris's Bill.

My public meeting is aimed at women born in the 1950s who are affected by the changes. I will be sending out letters with more information and requests to RSVP but if you believe you are one of the affected women and do not receive a letter, come to the meeting at the Meridian Centre on April 20 from 2pm to 3pm. I look forward to hearing from women locally who are affected and, if I get the chance to speak in the debate in Parliament, to share your stories.
