No members of the public were in attendance.

1 ES1 CHAIR ANNOUNCEMENTS

The Chair welcomed members to the first Environment and Sustainability committee, ran through the Civility and Respect statement, explained the fire procedure, reminded committee of the mobile phone protocol, that the meeting was being recorded and asked committee to pause for reflection for 1 minute.

There were no public questions.

3 ES3 TO CONSIDER APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE & SUBSTITUTIONS
Apologies were received from Cllr Sharkey.

4 ES4 TO RECEIVE DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST FROM COMMITTEE MEMBERS

7 ES7 TO DISCUSS AND AGREE ENVIRONMENT & SUSTAINABILITY COMMITTEE'S BUDGET REQUIREMENTS FOR 2026/2027
Members discussed potential inclusions, and the Parks Officer reminded members that other committee budgets were available.
It was proposed to set the budget to zero
Proposed by: Cllr Campbell **Seconded by:** Cllr Mills
Committee **resolved** to agree to the proposal.

8 ES8 TO NOTE ENVIRONMENT & SUSTAINABILITY COMMITTEE'S TERMS OF REFERENCE
The Terms of Reference were **noted**.

9 ES9 TO DISCUSS COMMUNITY ENERGY SCHEMES
No comments were made as the item's talk prior to the meeting did not go ahead.

10 ES10 TO RECEIVE BIODIVERSITY REPORTS AND MAKE RECOMMENDATIONS
Cllr Campbell explained the background to the reports and thanked the reports' authors.
The Parks Officer reminded members that finances would be needed for any projects, and suggested involving the community, including the forest school.

The Chair suggested looking the parks individually, the local bio-diversity record centre or a report from an expert were mentioned as ways to do this; Cllr Campbell suggested plant plugs for the long grass at Centenary Park, and Cllr Mills suggested he could donate Love-in-a-Mist wildflower seeds.

It was proposed to set up a TFG and bring a report back with funding to this committee for L&A to consider.

USE OF PESTICIDES

Pesticides include :-

Insecticides that kill insects.

Herbicides that kill plants.

Fungicides that kill fungal problems.

Pesticides are poisons designed to kill living organisms and are the only chemical deliberately introduced into the environment with the intention of doing fatal harm. They do not only affect the organisms they are targeted against, but can have negative, and often unforeseen, impacts on non target organisms and people.

Children are more vulnerable to their effects for a number of reasons: their bodies are still developing, they are exposed to greater amounts relative to their weight and they are often more directly in contact with sprayed areas such as playgrounds and sports pitches.

In the case of glyphosate, not only has it been classified as a probable carcinogen by the World Health Organisation (2015) but has also been linked to liver and kidney damage, imbalances in the intestinal microbiome and intestinal functions, genotoxicity, endocrine disruption, reproductive and development reduction, neurological damage and immune system dysfunction.

It is important to note that approval for use does not automatically mean safe to use. This is why since 2007 the World Health Organisation has collated and updated a list of the most hazardous pesticides currently in use.

Adopting different techniques need not be difficult or costly.

The first step is to assess pesticide use and how much it costs. Alternatives are as follows:-

Hand weeding is an option for smaller areas such as playgrounds and pathways through parks.

Acetic acid dilutions have been used very effectively to control weeds on hard surfaces in a variety of situations. Acetic is biodegradable and poses no risk of bioaccumulation.

Manual approaches are available in the form of different types of mulching such as bark and mulch mats. This is particularly useful for ornamental beds.

Flame treatment can be used successfully to eliminate weeds.

Steel brushing can be used for large scale areas such as pavements and roads and in combination with the use of acetic acid spraying can be a very effective alternative.

Hot foam systems, like hot water systems, kill plants using heat, and can be used in all weather conditions, near water courses and in the vicinity of children and dogs.

High pressure hot water treatments can be particularly effective and also have other uses such as chewing gum removal.

Electronic control systems that kill stems and roots instantly and are particularly suited to dealing with invasive species..

The benefits of reducing pesticide use.

Reduced exposure to potentially harmful chemicals for council employees and contractors.

Reduced exposure to potentially harmful chemicals for the general public.

Reduced spending on chemical inputs.

Increased sustainability as part of sustainability goals.

Positive message for the public.

Better habitats for bees, pollinators and other species.

Reduced contamination of water bodies. South East Water won't allow glyphosate use on their land.

Recommendations :-

1 This Council ceases the use of products containing glyphosate on council owned land and advises its contractors of this decision.

2 This Council works towards becoming pesticide free with the exception of the legal responsibility towards eradication of invasive species such as giant hogweed and Japanese knotweed.

PEACEHAVEN TOWN COUNCIL

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The Climate Emergency Motion was adopted by Peacehaven Town Council on 23rd July 2019

On 23rd July 2019, Peacehaven Town Council declared a Climate Emergency. With less than 12 years to switch away from fossil fuels to avoid the worst impacts of Climate Change. Reducing energy use and switching to clean energy will also increase energy security, improve air quality, minimise fuel poverty, boost the local economy and provide jobs and training.

It was proposed that Peacehaven Town Council declares a climate emergency and commits to going carbon neutral by 2030. This will help to raise the profile of this vital issue and secure external funding. It is also proposed that Peacehaven Town Council signs up to the Covenant of Mayors to track our progress and link with towns around the world who are cutting emissions.

It is now 2023 and the impacts of climate change are being felt all around the world with wildfires, flooding and drought. It is having a significant impact on food supplies. We are fast approaching and likely to exceed to 1.5 degree target set by the IPCC in October 2018.

There are just seven years left for Peacehaven Town Council to achieve its stated aim of being carbon neutral by 2030. Some progress has been made and plans are in place.

The focus of the next three years must be on our buildings and the redevelopment of the Meridian Centre by Morrisons gives us that opportunity.
